Let the Little Children Come

A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

It will surprise no one to learn that I have been thinking about children lately, babies in particular. As I write this, Isabel, Ezra, and I (patiently?) await the birth of our new little one. As you read this, we are adjusting to our new life as a family of four. I love being a parent; that's not to say that it's always easy or fun—sometimes it's work; but it's a work that gives me life. And most days, it's a joy. In these past three years of fatherhood, I have learned so much from Ezra. He has shown me how to be more in the moment, how to love passionately, how to live freely, how to be patient, how to be better in touch with my own emotions—in short, he has brought me to a deeper understanding of what it means to be a citizen of the kingdom of heaven.

Ezra's not special in this (though he's deeply precious to me). All children can show us what it means to be citizens of the kingdom. In Matthew 18 we read: "[Jesus] called a child, whom he put among [the disciples], and said, 'Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me'" (Matthew 18:2-5).

Children have a special connection to the kingdom. Their dependence upon their parents and their community models the sort of dependence we have (or should have) on God. When Ezra runs crying into my arms because he skinned his knee, I am reminded that this is how God desires me to run to Jesus when I am wounded. When Ezra gives me that big toothy grin and asks for a second piece of chocolate, I'm inclined to forget our "one-piece-a-day rule" because he makes me overflow with love. In a small way, this teaches me how God feels when God pours out God's grace upon me. Children have so much to teach us about our own relationship with God and our neighbors.

Often times we proclaim the value of children saying, "they are our future." But to say this is to value children for who they will be rather than for who they are now. And as a result, we push children off to the side until they grow up into that future person. The church has often been guilty of this. Children are considered full members of the congregation only after they have been confirmed, which is to say, grown up. In many churches, children are not invited to participate in council meetings or committee meetings or annual meetings until they have been confirmed or graduated high school. In many churches, children are sent to their own worship service in another room, out of earshot of the "adult service." So often in the church we keep children on the sidelines until we deem them "ready" to participate.

But that's not what Jesus says. Later, in Matthew's gospel, we hear, "Little children were being brought to

[Jesus] in order that he might lay his hands on them and pray. The disciples spoke sternly to those who brought them; but Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs'" (Matthew 19:13-14). Jesus proclaims that children have value *now*. Children do not inherit the kingdom when they grow up; it is theirs *now*.

The 20th century martyr and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer says this: societies push children to the margins; communities bring children to the center. Societies tend to push children out of the way until they establish value as mature adults. Communities, however, invite children into everything, proclaiming their value in the here and now. Societies expect chil-



dren to adapt to the needs of the society. Communities adapt to the needs of their children. Jesus calls us to be a *community* of faith, not a society.

We all have a responsibility toward children, whether you have children or not, whether they're your children or not. So what can we do to bring our children more to the center of our community here at Beaver Lutheran Church? What are some ways in which we have pushed them off to the sides? What can we do to acknowledge their deep value before God? How might we empower them to teach us more about the kingdom of heaven?

So often we believe that it is our role to teach children, and to some extent, of course, that is true. But we mustn't forget that it is also our role to *learn* from our children, as well. If we consider ourselves as students sitting at the feet of our children, rather than their teachers and masters, we may find ourselves becoming deeper, more faithful citizens of the kingdom of heaven.

As I turn my attention toward my sons, toward paternity leave, and the life of fatherhood, I will try my best to have a student's heart, that I may bring my children to the center of my community, that I may seek for all children to be held at the center, and that I may have the grace to let them teach me about the kingdom of heaven. Will you join me?


Zoom Get-togethers

Important Information about Altar Flowers

As you may have heard, Country Flowers has opted to no longer furnish altar flowers to local churches. The Worship and Music Committee has contacted various florists in the area for quotes, receiving several who were willing to deliver to Beavertown.



Following input from the congregation, the committee decided to use Graci's in Selinsgrove as our altar flower provider. As they are willing to provide flowers *only when requested*, the committee thought it was the best solution.

Graci's will charge \$50 a week to deliver two altar vases to the church (this was the lowest quote). If you do not wish to have flowers from Graci's, you may bring in your own flower arrangement in your own vase or basket. You are responsible for placing your arrangement and removing it from the church.

A new 2020 Flower Chart is located on the bulletin board with the names of those who had already signed up. On it, there is a place to check off if you wish to provide your own flowers, or if you wish the church to provide flowers.


